Description

Cal State LA Gives Back is a community engagement focused event in which 20 Cal State LA students are invited to participate in a day of service at a local non-profit community partner organization.

In partnership with United America Indian Involvement, Inc. <https://uail.org/> Cal State LA student volunteers provided support to the organization's food distribution event. Volunteers assisted with: preparing food boxes, transferring food boxes to recipients' vehicle (trunks), check-in event recipients and guide recipients through the drive-up event. The UAIL event is coordinate annually to provide resources to the American Indian community.

Volunteer Transportation: Cal State LA student volunteers will be transported to and from the event location via an EPIC program sponsored bus.

Food: Volunteers will be provided a lunch box sponsored by the EPIC program.

Safety materials: Volunteers will receive a mask, hand sanitizer, and safety guide information

Pre-service Volunteer Orientation, Nov 8: Volunteers will participate in a zoom orientation prior to the day of service hosted by UAIL. Agenda: Introduction to UAIL and services, Community History, Event Overview, Safety and Protocols

This event was the first in person event since pandemic. While we were initially not sure what to expect with student interest and commitment, we were overwhelmingly happy to see a great response. EPIC saw a fantastic interest by students to participation. Unfortunately, we were unable to accommodate all of the students as we had a max of 20 participants. This event has hosted up to 50 volunteers (past events), however due to our gradual move to in-person community engagement activities we planned for a smaller group of volunteers.

Our day of service was wonderful! The partner organization created a wonderful festival like setting to welcome their community members to their site. Our student volunteers really seemed to enjoy the site and the positive energy of our partner hosts. It was ESPECIALLY exciting to see our students working together, chatting and lunching together.

AMERICA READS AND COUNTS PROGRAM

Program Description

The ARAC program prepares Cal State LA students to transform their learning into ways that improve the quality of life for children. It aims to liberate communities and youth by promoting and advocating for education, social skills, health, and wellness.

Students offer mentorship, tutoring, college readiness preparation and workshops that focus on teaching and developing specific skills needed to succeed. In turn, they create a platform/curriculum that prepares our children to learn valuable life lessons overlooked by the district. These lessons are impactful when taught by college students whom have similar struggles and learn what it takes to persevere.

Cal State LA students learn to serve communities in the East Los Angeles, Lincoln Heights, and El Sereno areas and become inner-city experts that are exposed to a wide range of social and economic issues. This exposure helps shape their awareness of other cultures, personalities and different upbringings. By practicing their knowledge, skills and abilities with adversely affected communities they begin recognizing their own strengths as valuable citizens, capable of utilizing their education to positively change lives.

Student Employment Outcome

The ARC program has recruited and hired 14 Federal Work Study eligible students to serve our community partner sites. The tutors will reenter the school sites in-person starting spring. During fall semester, the students have been engaged in training and team building activities.

The goal of the program is to hire a total of 20 student tutors. It has been extremely challenging to recruit students and they have on boarded to the program in a staggering process. We have made attempts to outreach to students: two student-wide email notices went out; and several program directory-based emails went out to students.

Our community partner organizations are prepared to welcome students back into the classroom- this is a major accomplishment given the challenges the LAUSD schools have faced with repopulation protocols for students and personnel. This accomplishment speaks to the profound connection and roots the program has in the community, and the commitment and diligent leadership of the Program Coordinator, Erica Martinez.

The program t-shirts were designed by the program tutors. They will be worn in the field. The t-shirts will help with reestablishing Cal State LA student presence in the community & school sites, and will build a sense of pride for the tutors who wear them.
